AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the flying of kites within certain limits.

[29th April, 1920.]

BE it enacted by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Kites (prohibition) Ordinance, 1920.

Flying of kites prohibited in Port-of-Spain and any borough or proclaimed area.

2. Whoever shall fly or attempt to fly any kite in any place within the limits of the City of Port-of-Spain or of any Borough, or in any other area which may be declared by the Governor by proclamation to be an area to which this Ordinance applies, shall be guilty of an offence and shall on summary conviction before a Magistrate forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one pound.

Constabulary may destroy kites.

3. It shall be lawful for any member of the Constabulary Force to destroy any kite which any person shall fly or attempt to fly in contravention of this Ordinance.

4. This Ordinance shall not apply to the flying of kites in the Queen's Park in Port-of-Spain, and in the Arima Savannah. Ordinance not to apply to certain places.

Passed in Council this Twenty-third day of April in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty.
