REPUBLIC OF TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

Act No. 31 of 1980

[L.S.]

AN ACT to re-enact and bring into operation certain Ordinances and to validate things done under such Ordinances and for matters incidental thereto.

[Assented to 4th July, 1980]

WHEREAS it is enacted *inter alia* by subsection (1) of section 13 of the Constitution that an Act of Parliament to which that section applies may expressly declare that it shall have effect even though inconsistent with sections 4 and 5 of the Constitution and, if any such Act does so declare, it shall have effect accordingly:

And whereas it is provided by subsection (2) of the said section 13 of the Constitution that an Act of Parliament to which that section applies is one the Bill for which has been passed by both Houses of Parliament and at the final vote thereon in each House has been supported by the votes of not less than three-fifths of all the members of that House:

And whereas it is necessary and expedient that the provisions of this Act shall have effect even though inconsistent with sections 4 and 5 of the Constitution:

Now THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of Trinidad and Tobago as follows:—

1. (1) This Act may be cited as the Scheduled Ordinances (Re-enactment, Commencement and Validation) Act, 1980.

(2) This Act shall have effect even though inconsistent with sections 4 and 5 of the Constitution.

2. In this Act "scheduled ordinances" means the Ordinances set out in the First Column of the Schedule.

3. (1) For the avoidance of doubt it is hereby declared that subject to subsection (2) each of the scheduled ordinances is re-enacted and deemed to have come into operation on the date specified in the Second Column of the Schedule in relation to that Ordinance.

(2) The Hansen's Disease Control Ordinance, 1961 is deemed to have continued in operation until 30th December, 1979.

4. All things done under and in pursuance of any scheduled ordinance are declared to have been lawfully and validly done and no action or other legal proceedings whether pending or not shall lie against the state or any other person in respect or in consequence of things done under and in pursuance of any scheduled ordinance, by reason only that at the material time that scheduled ordinance may not have been in operation.

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5. The scheduled ordinances shall be construed up to scheduled and including 31st July, 1976 with such amendments and ordinances to be modifications as are necessary to bring them into con-conformity with formity with the Trinidad and Tobago Constitution set ^{Constitution} out in the Second Schedule to the Trinidad and Tobago (Constitution) Order-in-Council, 1962 and thereafter with the Constitution.
