## No. 10.—1875.

AN ORDINANCE for the appointment of a Director of Public Works.

(L.S.) HENRY T. IRVING.

3rd June, 1875.

**B**E it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

Short title. 1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Public Works Director Ordinance, 1875."

Appointment of Director of Public Works. 2. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time to appoint such person as she sees fit to be Director of Public Works, and every person so appointed shall hold office during the pleasure of Her Majesty. The Director of Public Works shall be paid such salary as the Governor,

with the consent of the Legislative Council, from time to time allows.

3. The Director of Public Works shall have the charge and management of all public works and public buildings and the superintendence of all public roads and such other duties as by any Ordinance may be imposed upon him. The Director of Public Works shall also exercise all powers vested in and discharge all duties imposed upon or transferred to the Superintendent of Public Works.

Duties of

4. The Director of Public Works shall not be personally liable in respect of any contract entered into or liability incurred by the Director of Public Works in his official capacity.

Suits against  
Director of  
Public  
Works.

The Director of Public Works in respect of any right vested in him in his official capacity may sue in his name of office and in respect of any claim made against him in his official capacity may be sued by his name of office.

In case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director of Public Works all pending actions, suits or other proceedings by or against the Director of Public Works shall not abate but may be continued and maintained by or against his successor in office.

5. Her Majesty may appoint any person or persons to be assistant or assistants to the Director of Public Works and the Director of Public Works may delegate to any such assistant any of the duties imposed upon, or any of the powers exercisable by, the Director of Public Works. Every such assistant shall hold office during Her Majesty's pleasure, and shall be paid such salary as the Governor with the consent of the Legislative Council from time to time allows.

6. The office of Superintendent of Public Works, and all offices the duties whereof are by any Ordinance transferred to the Superintendent of Public Works are hereby abolished, and all rights, powers, duties, liabilities and obligations by any Ordinance vested in or transferred to the Superintendent of Public Works are hereby vested in and transferred to and imposed upon the Director of Public Works.

7. The Ordinances specified in the schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed: Provided that such repeal, except so far as regards the transfer by virtue of this Ordinance of the rights, powers, duties, liabilities and obligations of the Superintendent of Public Works shall not affect any right accrued or obligation incurred before the commencement of this Ordinance or any remedy in respect of the same.

AN ORDINANCE for regulating Appeals from Summary Convictions.

(L. S.) HENRY T. IRVING.

*5th June, 1875.*

**B**E it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as Short title.  
 "The Summary Convictions Appeal Ordinance, 1875."

2. In this Ordinance :

The term "person" includes any body politic, incor-  
 porated or unincorporated ;

Interpreta-  
 tion of terms

The terms "Justice" and "Justice or Justices" mean any Stipendiary or other Justice and Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction ;

The term "complainant" means the person who laid the information or complaint ;

The term "defendant" means the person against whom the information was laid or the complaint made ;

The term "appellant" means the person making the appeal ; and the term "respondent" means the person defending a conviction or order, or a refusal to make a conviction or order ;

The term "the Court" means the Supreme Civil Court.

3. Either of the following parties (that is to say) :— Appeal from  
 Order of  
 Justice.

1. Where a Justice refuses to make a conviction or order, the complainant ; or,

2. Where a Justice makes a conviction or order ordering any of the following things (that is to say) :—

a. Payment of a penalty not less than five pounds ; or

b. The doing of some act other than the payment of money and that in case of default in the doing of such act the defendant be imprisoned or be imprisoned and kept to hard labour ; or

c. Imprisonment with or without hard labour, the party against whom the conviction or order is made may appeal to the Court against the decision of the Justice : Provided that the appellant give to the Justice notice in writing of such appeal within three days after such refusal, or such conviction or order is made, and also if a complainant enter into the following recognizance, that is to say, a recognizance with one sufficient surety acknowledged before a Justice and con-

ditioned to appear and prosecute the appeal and abide by the judgment of the Court thereupon and pay such costs as may be by the Court awarded, and if a defendant either enter into a like recognizance or remain in custody till the hearing of the appeal.

Upon such notice being given and such recognizance being entered into, the Justice before whom the recognizance is entered into shall liberate the appellant, if in custody.

Hearing  
appeals.

4. All such appeals shall be heard by the Court in the town of Port-of-Spain, and notwithstanding anything contained in Ordinance 11 of 1872, intituled "An Ordinance for altering the Sittings of the Supreme Courts" or in any other Ordinance, the Court shall sit for the hearing of such appeals twice in every month, on such days as the Court from time to time, by general order, appoints.

Petition of  
appeal.

5. The appellant shall, within the period of fifteen days at the most after notice of appeal, deliver to the Registrar of the Court a petition in writing setting forth his grounds of appeal. Any appellant who fails to deliver such petition within the period aforesaid, shall be deemed to have abandoned his appeal, and any Justice having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint may proceed forthwith to enforce the conviction or order (if any) in the same manner as if no notice of appeal had been given, and may, without any further notice, by memorandum endorsed on the recognizance given in respect of the appeal, declare the same to be forfeited.

Notice of  
appeal.

6. No appeal shall be heard unless the appellant, within seven days after the delivery of his petition of appeal, gives notice in writing of such appeal to the adverse party, and within seven days of such delivery files with the Registrar of the Court an affidavit verifying the service of such notice. The notice shall specify the time when such appeal is to be heard, and shall be signed by the person giving the same or by his solicitor. The grounds of appeal shall be specified in every such notice, and it shall not be lawful for the appellant, on the hearing of any appeal, to go into or give evidence of any ground of appeal not set forth in the notice. If

any appellant fails to give notice and file his affidavit within the time hereinbefore mentioned, the appeal shall be deemed to be abandoned, and the Court may direct the conviction or order to be enforced by any Justice having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint, and the Court or any such Justice as aforesaid may, without any further notice, by memorandum endorsed on the recognizance given in respect of the appeal, declare the same to be forfeited.

7. The notice of the time when the appeal is to be heard shall be given on the part of the appellant to or left at the place of business or abode of the respondent ten clear days at least before the appeal is to be heard.

8. Upon every appeal it shall be lawful for the Court to consider the evidence and the merits of the case whereon the judgment appealed against was made, and also where it appears to the Court that through want of advice or other reasonable cause any new evidence tendered to it was not adduced in the Court below may examine any further or other evidence adduced by either party, and the Court may reverse or confirm in whole or in part the judgment appealed against or give such new or different judgment as it thinks just.

9. Every person who, being summoned to appear and give evidence upon any appeal, neglects or refuses to appear at the time and place specified in the summons, or who having appeared refuses to give evidence according to the best of his knowledge and belief, shall for every such offence forfeit such sum not exceeding five pounds as to the Court seems fit.

Refusal to  
give evidence.

10. If upon any appeal there is any defect in form in the information or complaint, or in any part of the proceedings or in the record thereof such defect may be amended.

Defects of  
form.

11. Upon the hearing of any appeal no objection on account of any defect in the form of setting forth any ground of appeal shall be allowed, and no objection to the reception of evidence offered in support of any ground of appeal shall prevail unless the Court is of opinion that the ground of appeal is so imperfectly or incorrectly stated as to be insufficient to enable the

party receiving the same to enquire into the subject or such statement and to prepare for trial : Provided always. that in all cases where the Court is of opinion that any objection to any ground of appeal or to the reception of evidence in support thereof ought to prevail, it shall be lawful for the Court, if it so thinks fit, to cause the ground of appeal to be forthwith amended by the Registrar on such terms as to payment of costs or postponing the trial or both payment of costs and postponement as to the Court appear just and reasonable.

Amendment

or orders.

12. If upon the hearing of any appeal against a conviction or order any objection is made on account of any omission or mistake in the drawing up of such conviction or order, and it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Court that sufficient grounds were in proof before the Justice making the conviction or order to authorise the drawing up thereof free from the omission or mistake, it shall be lawful for the Court, upon such terms as to payment of costs, as it thinks fit, to amend the conviction or order and to adjudicate thereupon as if no omission or mistake had existed.

Frivolous  
grounds  
of appeal.

13. If in any notice of appeal the appellant includes any ground of appeal, which in the opinion of the Court is frivolous or vexatious, such appellant, even though successful, shall be liable, if the Court thinks fit so to order, to pay the whole or any part of the costs incurred by the respondent in disputing any such ground of appeal, such costs to be recovered in the manner in this Ordinance directed as to other costs incurred by reason of such appeal.

Costs of  
appeal.

14. Upon any appeal the Court may, if it thinks fit, order the party against whom the same is decided to pay to the other party such costs and charges as to the Court appear just and reasonable, such costs to be recoverable in the manner in this Ordinance provided.

Costs where  
appeal not  
prosecuted.

15. The Court, upon proof of notice of appeal having been given to the party entitled to receive the same, though such appeal was not afterwards prosecuted or entered, may, if it so thinks fit, award to the party receiving the notice, such costs and charges as by the Court are thought just and reasonable, to be paid by the party

giving the notice and to be recoverable in manner in this Ordinance provided.

16. At any time after an appeal against any conviction or order has been decided any Judge of the Court or any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint may issue such warrant as is required for the execution of the judgment or order of the Court. If upon any appeal the Court orders either party to pay costs, such order shall direct such costs to be paid to the Registrar of the Court to be by him paid over to the party entitled to the same, and shall state within what time such costs are to be paid, and if the same are not paid within the time so stated, the Registrar, upon application of the party entitled to such costs or his solicitor, shall grant a certificate that the costs have not been paid. Upon production of such certificate to any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint, it shall be lawful for such Justice by memorandum endorsed upon the recognizance, if any, given in respect of the appeal to declare such recognizance to be forfeited.

17. Where any recognizance is declared to be forfeited any Justice having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint may forthwith or at any time after such declaration issue a warrant of commitment against any person liable, whether as principal or surety, under such recognizance for any time not exceeding two months unless the amount due under such recognizance and the costs of the commitment and conveying such person to prison, if such Justice thinks fit so to order, (the amount thereof being ascertained and stated in the warrant) are sooner paid.

18. Where in respect of any appeal no recognizance has been entered into, any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction over the matter of the information or complaint upon production to him of the Registrar's certificate that the costs have not been paid, may issue a warrant of commitment against any person liable for such costs for any time not exceeding one month unless the amount of such costs and the costs of commitment and conveying the party to prison, if such Justice thinks

fit so to order (the amount thereof being ascertained and stated in the commitment) be sooner paid.

19. In all cases where any person against whom a warrant of commitment for non-payment of a penalty or any sum of money only is issued, pays or tenders to the constable having the execution of the same, the sum or sums in such warrant mentioned together with the amount of the expenses of such warrant up to the time of such payment or tender, the constable shall cease to execute the warrant. In all cases in which any person is imprisoned for non-payment of any penalty or any sum of money he may pay or caused to be paid to the keeper of the prison in which he is imprisoned the sum in the warrant of commitment mentioned, together with the amount of the costs, charges and expenses (if any) therein also mentioned, and such keeper shall receive the same and shall thereupon discharge such person, if he be in his custody for no other matter.

Disposal of  
penalties.

20. If any person pays, by virtue of this Ordinance, to any constable or other officer any penalty or sum of money, such constable or other officer shall forthwith pay the same to the Stipendiary Justice of the Peace for the district or county in which the information or complaint was laid or made. If any person committed to prison by virtue of this Ordinance, upon any order for non-payment of any penalty or sum of money pays the same and any costs, charges or expenses to the keeper of the prison, the keeper shall forthwith pay the same to the Stipendiary Justice for the district or county in which the information or complaint was laid or made. All sums so received by the Stipendiary Justice shall forthwith be paid by him to the party to whom the same are to be paid according to the directions of the law or Ordinance on which the information or complaint was framed, or if such law or Ordinance contains no directions for payment thereof, into the Colonial Treasury.

Forms.

21. Proceedings under this Ordinance may be according to the forms in the first Schedule to this Ordinance.

Rules and  
tables of  
fees.

22. It shall be lawful for the Judges of the Supreme Civil Court to establish and from time to time to alter

or revoke such rules as to them seem meet for the regulation and practice of the Court with regard to appeals, and also to frame and from time to time to alter or revoke a table of the fees to be paid for the services which may be required to be performed under the provisions of this Ordinance, and also of the costs that may be allowed to any party to any appeal, and all such rules or tables or altered rules or tables, shall be transmitted under the seal of the Court to the Governor, and, if approved of by resolution of the Legislative Council but not otherwise, shall be published by the Governor in the *Royal Gazette*, and take effect immediately on such publication.

23. It shall be lawful for the Registrar of the Supreme Court to demand and receive such fees from the appellant and the respondent in any appeal under this Ordinance as may be fixed and appointed by any table of fees made under this Ordinance.

Fees to be paid to Registrar.

24. All fees paid under this Ordinance to the Registrar of the Court shall be paid over by him to the Receiver General for the use of the Colony.

Application of fees paid to Registrar.

25. Where by any Ordinance an appeal is given to the Supreme Civil Court as a Court of Appeal under Ordinance 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for regulating Appeals from Summary Convictions and Orders," an appeal shall lie to such Court under this Ordinance, and the proceedings upon such appeal shall be according to this Ordinance.

Existing rights of appeal.

26. All appeals pending at the time of the passing of this Ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance.

Pending appeals.

27. The enactments specified in the second schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed. Provided that until rules and a table of fees are framed under this Ordinance, the rules and table of fees (if any) framed under Ordinance 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for regulating Appeals from Summary Convictions and Orders," shall have the same effect as if framed under this Ordinance.

Repeal of enactment.
