AN ORDINANCE to amend “The Education Ordinance, 1875.”

(L.S.) S. FREELING, *Governor.*

12th December, 1881.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as Short title. “The Education Ordinance, 1875, Amendment Ordinance, 1881.”

2. This Ordinance shall be read and construed as one Construction with “The Education Ordinances, 1870 and 1875.”

3. The sixth section of “The Education Ordinance, Repeal. 1875,” is hereby repealed.

4. Subject to the provisions of “The Education Ord- Capitation grants. nances, 1870 and 1875,” there shall be allowed and paid for each pupil who has passed at the annual examination of the school by an Inspector of Schools the following capitation grants, viz. :

For each pupil at a school established by the Govern-
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ment and maintained entirely from the public funds of the Colony, six shillings.

For each pupil at an assisted school, twenty-five shillings.

The annual capitation grant given under this Ordinance shall not be allowed for any pupil who has not attended at the school for one hundred days or upwards in the course of the period of a year in respect of which the examination is held.

Alteration of
capitation

5. Power is hereby given to the Board of Education from time to time by resolution, to alter the amounts respectively of the capitation grant made by this Ordinance, and to fix other amounts in lieu of them.

Such resolution shall be laid on the table of the Legislative Council, and if and when sanctioned by resolution of the Legislative Council, shall have the force and effect of law.

AN ORDINANCE for prohibiting the keeping open of
Shops after a certain hour on Sunday.

(L.S.) S. FREELING, *Governor.*

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance,

The expression "shop" means any house in which goods, wares or merchandise is exposed for sale;

The expression "house" means any dwelling-house, store, warehouse, counting-house, manufactory,
