AN ORDINANCE to provide for the payment of pensions to teachers in Assisted Elementary Schools.

**B**E it enacted by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Assisted School Teachers Pensions Ordinance, 1912.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance—

“Government School” means a school established and maintained by the Board of Education from the public funds of the Colony under the provisions of the Elementary Education Ordinance, No. 147.

“Assisted School” means a school established and entitled to receive aid from the public funds of the Colony under the provisions of the last mentioned Ordinance.

3. A teacher in an Assisted School shall be entitled to receive a pension or gratuity, as the case may be, under the same circumstances and subject to the same conditions as a Teacher in a Government School; and the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, No. 175 and the regulations made thereunder shall apply to a teacher in an Assisted School in the same manner in all respects as if he were a Teacher in a Government School. Provided always that the service of a Teacher in an Assisted School shall be deemed unbroken or continuous for the purposes of the said Ordinance and Regulations notwithstanding any temporary suspension of employment as a Teacher in any Assisted School not exceeding six months at any one time due to his dismissal by the Managers of any such school for a cause other than misconduct.
