AN ORDINANCE to provide for the extension of the
Royal Botanic Gardens.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the extension of the Regulations respecting the Royal Botanic Gardens to any land used for the time being for the purposes of cultivation under Government superintendence of any vegetable product: Be it enacted by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Royal Short title. Botanic Gardens Ordinance, 1898."

It shall be read as one with "The Royal Botanic Gardens Ordinance, 1894," hereinafter called the Principal Ordinance.

Extension of

2. In Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance the words "the Gardens" shall include lands in addition to those delineated in the plan in such section mentioned which shall have been from time to time acquired or appropriated with the sanction of the Governor and Legislative Council for any experimental plantation or for the cultivation of any vegetable products under the direction of the Superintendent; and the Superintendent shall include the person or persons for the time being in charge of the Gardens or of any such additional land.

Governor may

3. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to proclaim any such additional land as aforesaid which may be intended to be used for the purposes aforesaid a Botanic Garden within the meaning of this and of the Principal Ordinance, and to make additional special regulations with respect thereto within the provisions of Section 3 of the Principal Ordinance.

Passed in Council this Fourteenth day of March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.
