AN ORDINANCE to amend the Notaries Public (Tobago)
Ordinance, Ch. 7. No. 5

[By Proclamation]

ENACTED by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the
advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof. Enactment

1. (1) This Ordinance may be cited as the Notaries Public Short title
(Tobago) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1954, and shall be read as
one with the Notaries Public (Tobago) Ordinance, in this Ch. 7. No. 5
Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

(2) This Ordinance shall not come into operation unless and until the Governor notifies by proclamation that it is Her Majesty's pleasure not to disallow the same and thereafter it shall come into operation upon such day as the Governor shall notify by the same or any other proclamation.

2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section :—

“Governor
to appoint
Notary
Public
for Tobago”
2. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint the person for the time being discharging the duties of Sub-Registrar of the Supreme Court in Tobago to be a Notary Public for the Island of Tobago.

(2) If for any reason he shall think it expedient so to do, it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint a person other than the Sub-Registrar of the Supreme Court to be a Notary Public for the Island of Tobago : Provided that no such person shall be appointed unless he shall have been previously examined and approved of by one of the Judges of the Supreme Court or by the Attorney General or Solicitor General touching his fitness to discharge the duties of a Notary Public.

(3) If any person other than the Sub-Registrar of the Supreme Court be appointed, such person shall on his appointment pay the sum of twenty-four dollars into the Treasury.”

3. Section 3 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by deleting the words “and shall on his appointment pay the sum of twenty-four dollars into the Treasury”, occurring at the end thereof.

4. Section 9 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section :—

“Fees”
9. (1) Every Notary Public shall be entitled to demand and to receive in respect of the duties of his office such fees as may from time to time be prescribed by the Governor and published in the *Royal Gazette*.

(2) If the person performing the duties of Notary Public shall be the Sub-Registrar of the Supreme Court, he shall pay all such fees into the Treasury to the credit of general revenue; if he shall be a person other than the Sub-Registrar of the Supreme Court he shall be entitled to retain all such fees for his own use.”
