AN ORDINANCE for the Incorporation of The Arima Race Club.

[14th June, 1956.]

Commencement.

WHEREAS there has been established in the Colony an Association known as "The Arima Race Club": Preamble.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the said Association should be incorporated for the purpose of exercising the powers hereinafter set forth :

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Arima Race Club (Incorporation) Ordinance, 1956.

Incorporation.

2. The Association known as "The Arima Race Club" shall be and is hereby created a body corporate and by that name shall have perpetual succession, and may sue and be sued in all courts of justice in the Colony by that name, and shall have and use a common seal with power from time to time to change such seal.

Powers of the Corporation.

3. The corporate body hereby created shall have power—

(a) to make, adopt, establish and enforce any rules and regulations for and concerning the nomination, election, suspension, removal and expulsion of members and officers; the management, collection and disposal of its property and funds; the conduct, regulation and management of its affairs and of any other matter or thing whatsoever which may in any wise concern the good government of the said corporate body; and the same to amend, vary, repeal or promulgate from time to time as may seem proper: Provided always that no such rules or regulations be in any wise repugnant or contrary to Her Majesty's prerogative or to the laws of this Colony and that the same shall not affect any person or persons other than those who are or may become members of the said corporate body;

(b) to promote and hold race meetings under the Rules of Racing of the Trinidad Turf Club or other recognised Turf Authority responsible for controlling horse racing in Trinidad and Tobago and, in connection therewith, to exercise all such powers and do all such things as are usual or incidental to the holding of such race meetings;

(c) to acquire by purchase, transfer, donation, exchange, devise, bequest, grant, gift, conveyance or howsoever otherwise, any real or personal property or any estate or interest therein;

(d) to accept surrenders or re-conveyances and to enter into contracts;

- (e) subject to any restraint, reservation or condition contained in the document under which it shall have acquired title thereto, to sell, demise, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of and deal with all property which may for the time being be vested in or have been acquired by it.

4. All documents requiring the seal of the said corporate body shall be sealed with its common seal in the presence of its President and /or Vice-President and Secretary for the time being in Office who shall sign every such document, and such signing shall be *prima facie* evidence that the said seal was duly affixed and the same is the lawful seal of the corporation.

Mode of execution of documents.

5. The said corporate body shall at all times have a fixed address for the service of documents on the corporation and such address shall be registered with the Registrar-General. All documents to be served on the corporation may be served by leaving the same at, or by sending the same by registered post to, the address registered.

Service of documents on the corporation.

6. Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the right of Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors or of any bodies politic or corporate or of any other persons except such as are mentioned or referred to in this Ordinance and those claiming by, through, from or under them.

Saving of Crown and other rights.

Passed in Council this sixth day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-six.
