

Saturday in each week during the year: And whereas it is expedient to give the Governor authority to appoint the days on which the Stipendiary Justices shall sit in their several districts for the hearing of actions and suits under the said recited Ordinance: Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, That it shall be lawful for the Governor by Proclamation under his hand and seal, from time to time, to fix and appoint the days on which the several Stipendiary Justices, within their several districts, shall sit for the hearing of all actions and suits under the said recited Ordinance of the first day of August, and to alter the same as he shall see fit, anything in the said recited Ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding.

Passed in Council this first day of October, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

AN ORDINANCE for the Regulation of Races in the Queen's Park.

**B**E it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, That it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time by writing under his hand to grant to such persons as he shall see fit, acting as Stewards of the Races hereinafter mentioned, permission to hold Races

in the Queen's Park upon such days, to be named in such writing, as the Governor may see fit.

2. That it shall be lawful for the persons from time to time acting as the Stewards of such Races at all reasonable times before the days appointed for such Races, to erect or cause to be erected in the Queen's Park all such stands for the accommodation of the subscribers to such Races, and of the public, and such other buildings as they shall see necessary, and to keep the same erected during the continuance of such Races and for a reasonable time thereafter: And all such buildings shall be removed by such Stewards, and the ground on which the same shall have been erected shall be restored to its former condition within fourteen days at the most after the last day of such Races respectively.

3. That it shall be lawful for the Stewards of such Races, by writing under the hand of the Secretary for the time being of the Committee of such Races, to grant licenses to such persons as they shall see fit to vend and expose for sale food and refreshments within the precincts of the Queen's Park on any days of such Races.

4. That it shall be lawful for the persons from time to time acting as the Stewards of such Races to exact and take such sums of money as they may deem reasonable for the admission of persons to the stands to be erected under the authority of this Ordinance, and also for the admission of every carriage, cart or other vehicle, and of every horse, mare or gelding, mule or ass, within the Queen's Park on any days of such Races.

5. That it shall be lawful for any police constable, and any person acting in the aid of such constable, to put off and remove from the Queen's Park any person who, not being duly licensed by the Stewards so to do, shall sell, or offer, or expose for sale any meat, drink or other refreshment within the limits of the Queen's Park on any day on which such Races shall be holden, and also to prevent from entering within and to turn back and remove from the Queen's Park any carriage, cart or other vehicle, horse, mare, gelding, mule or ass in respect of which the sum of money payable for the admission of the same shall not have been paid.

6. That all moneys to be received by the Stewards of such Races under this Ordinance shall be applied towards the payment of the expenses of such Races and of the prizes for horses running at such Races.

AN ORDINANCE for encouraging the formation of  
Tram Roads.

Preamble.

Power to take  
up on loan on  
Debenture  
moneys for

**W**HEREAS the carriage of the staple products and the general traffic of the Island would be rendered more cheap and easy by Tram Roads to be laid down in the Rural Districts: and whereas it is expedient for the promotion of such Tram Roads that money should be borrowed on the faith of the general revenue of the Colony and applied to the laying down of such Tram Roads, and that the repayment of such moneys should be secured on the several plantations and lands through which such Tram Roads shall be carried, and the tolls to be taken on such Tram Roads: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, That it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to take up by way of loan on debenture such sums of money as he shall see fit so always that the whole principal moneys of the debentures to be issued under the
