AN ORDINANCE for the recovery of penalties and forfeitures under any Ordinance relating to the duties on Rum and other Spirits.

CHARLES ELLIOT.

WHEREAS by a certain Ordinance passed in Council on the eleventh day of December, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and entitled “An Ordinance to regulate the mode of proceeding for the recovery of penalties and forfeitures under an Ordinance entitled an Ordinance to raise a duty on Rum and other Spirits manufactured in the Colony,” it is enacted that all penalties and forfeitures imposed by the Ordinance therein mentioned shall and may be sued for, prosecuted and recovered by information in the Supreme Civil Court of the said Island in the name of Her Majesty’s Attorney General for the said Island, or by information before any two or more Justices of the Peace in the said Island, in the manner in the said Ordinance provided: And whereas since the passing of the said recited Ordinance, divers other Ordinances have been passed with respect to the duties on Rum and other Spirits manufactured in this Colony: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government that all penalties and forfeitures imposed or to be imposed by any Ordinance or Ordinances now in force or which may hereafter be enacted by the Council of Government respecting or relating to the duties on Rum and other Spirits manufactured in this Colony shall be recovered, levied and enforced according to the provisions of the said Ordinance of the eleventh day of December in the same manner and in all respects as penalties and forfeitures under the said Ordinance entitled “An Ordinance to raise a duty on Rum and other Spirits manufactured in the Colony.”

Passed in Council this second day of July, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

AN ORDINANCE for introducing a Supply of Water from the River Ariapita, for the use of the Port of Spain Water Works.

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed in Council on the eighteenth day of November, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, entitled "An Ordinance for supplying the Town of Port of Spain and the vicinity thereof with Water:" and whereas in pursuance of the powers given by the said Ordinance the waters of the River Maraval and of the River St. Ann have been brought down into the town of Port of Spain: and whereas it is expedient that for the use of the inhabitants of the said town, and more particularly for the use of the Public Hospital and the public washhouses which it is proposed to erect the supply of water should be increased by taking the waters of the River Ariapita in the Valley of Saint Ann at a point within the lands in the ward of St. Ann belonging to Pierre Debot, Esquire, and called Monte Christo: and whereas of the two sums of twenty thousand pounds and four thousand pounds appropriated to the erection of the said Water Works the sum of one thousand pounds remains still unexpended: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor
