

penalty cannot be levied.

offence shall not be paid and cannot be levied, or the person incurring any such penalty is not able to pay the same, but in lieu thereof is sent to prison, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor to cause such reward as he shall think fit, not exceeding fifty pounds in each case, to be paid out of the Colonial Treasury to the supervisor or officer of customs who shall have informed and prosecuted for such offence.

78. All penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance shall or may be sued for, recovered, levied or enforced according to the provisions of the Ordinance passed in Council on the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, entitled "an Ordinance to regulate the mode of proceeding for the recovery of penalties and forfeitures under an Ordinance, entitled 'an Ordinance to raise a duty on rum and other spirits manufactured in the Colony.'"

Interpretation clause.

79. In this Ordinance the word Supervisor shall extend to and include all Assistant Supervisors, the words Police Constable shall extend to and include all Ward Constables, and every word importing the singular number shall extend and be applied to several persons or things as well as one person or thing and every word importing the masculine gender only shall extend and be applied to a female as well as a male.

AN ORDINANCE to revive and make perpetual a certain Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend an Ordinance entitled 'An Ordinance for the Estab-

lishment of a Public Library in the Town of Port of Spain,' and to make provision for better securing the Books and Chattels of the said Public Library."

WHEREAS on the first day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one an Ordinance was passed entitled "An Ordinance for the establishment of a public library in the "Town of Port of Spain : " And whereas on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two another Ordinance was passed to amend the said Ordinance of the first day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one : And whereas the said Ordinance of the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two having expired, afterwards on the first day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five another Ordinance was passed to revive and continue in force the said Ordinance of the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and it was thereby enacted that the said Ordinance of the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two should be and the same was thereby revived, and should be and continue in force as from the first day of March then last past for and during the term of five years thence next ensuing : And whereas the said Ordinance of the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two having expired, it is expedient to revive the same, and to make the same perpetual, and also to make further provision for the better government of the said public library : Be it therefore enacted by his Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government as follows :

1. The said Ordinance of the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two shall be and the same is hereby revived as from the expiration thereof, and shall be and remain permanently in force, and have perpetually the force and effect of law in this Colony.

2. In all actions, suits, indictments, informations and other proceedings whatsoever before any Court of

Justice Civil or Criminal, or before any Justice of the Peace for or in respect of or concerning any book, manuscript, or specimen of art or science, or any chattel whatsoever at any time heretofore or hereafter purchased for or given to or deposited in the said Public Library, or for or in respect of the stealing or taking away, or loss or conversion of the same or any of them, or any spoil damage or injury to the same or any of them, it shall be sufficient to state the property in such book, manuscript, or specimen of art or science, or other chattel as the case may be, to be in the Librarian for the time being of the said Public Library, and all such actions, suits, indictments, informations and other proceedings shall and may be brought, instituted, prosecuted, and carried on by or in the name of the Librarian for the time being of the said Public Library.

Preamble.
