AN ORDINANCE for excepting from Duties of Customs certain goods used in the formation of Tramroads.

ROB. W. KEATE.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the several goods mentioned in the Schedule to this Ordinance already imported or which may hereafter be imported into this Colony for the formation of any public Tramroad should be exempted from all duties of Customs: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor on its being made to appear to him to his satisfaction that any goods or articles enumerated in the Schedule to this Ordinance which may have already been or may hereafter be imported into this Colony, have been imported for the formation of any Tramroad, or as part of the rolling stock of any Tramroad, to make order in writing that such goods shall be exempted from all duties of Customs, and thereupon the several goods mentioned in any such order shall be exempted accordingly.

2. That a statement of the several goods and the qualities and declared values of the same which shall be so exempted shall be laid before the Council of Government at the first meeting of Council in each year.
