AN ORDINANCE to make perpetual a certain Ordinance enacted in the year 1846, and intituled "An Ordinance to amend the laws relating to Usury."

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed on the second day of March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, intituled "An Ordinance to amend the laws relating to Usury," and limited to be and continue in force for and during the term of seven years next after the commencement thereof, and no longer: And whereas by another Ordinance passed on the first day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, the said recited Ordinance of the second day of March, was continued for the further term of seven years from and after the said first day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three: and whereas it is expedient that the said first recited Ordinance of the second day of March should remain permanently in force: Be it, therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, That the provisions of the said Ordinance, of the second day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six intituled "An Ordinance to amend the laws relating to Usury," shall be and remain permanently in force, and have perpetually the force and effect of law in this Colony.

Passed in Council this twenty-second day of March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.
