AN ORDINANCE to admit holders of foreign diplomas
as members of the Medical Board.

WHEREAS it is expedient to repeal Ordinance No. 19, of 1863, and to supplement Ordinance No. 5, of 1846, so as to enable holders of foreign diplomas to become members of the Medical Board of this Island: Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. Ordinance No. 19 of 1863 shall be, and is hereby repealed; and any person, not being a member of the Medical Board, who shall, twelve months after the passing of this Ordinance, practise physic or surgery, or perform any surgical operation, or prescribe any medical or surgical treatment within this Island, in respect of which he shall demand or receive any fee or gratuity, shall, for the first offence, forfeit and pay twenty pounds sterling; for the second, or any subsequent offence, fifty pounds sterling.

Provided always that this clause shall not apply to nor affect any person holding a diploma or license from any university, college, or other body, qualifying him to practise medicine or surgery in the colony or foreign country where such degree, license, or other diploma was obtained, provided that he was actually residing and practising medicine or surgery in this Island at the time of the passing of this Ordinance, and provided that he can produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Governor, or Medical Board, that he has gone through such a course of study as to insure the requisite knowledge and skill for the practice of his profession.

2. Any person holding a diploma or license from any foreign university or college to practise medicine or surgery, on producing a certificate from the Royal College of Physicians of London that he has passed suc-

cessfully an examination in whatever branches of medical science the said College may determine upon, shall subject to the regulations contained in clause XII. of Ordinance No. 5, of 1846, become and be a member of the Medical Board, and entitled to all the privileges of such members.

3. The examination of holders of foreign diplomas or licenses shall be conducted by sealed papers, in such a manner and under such regulations and conditions, as the Royal College of Physicians of London and the Medical Board, by bye-laws to be approved of by His Excellency the Governor, shall think fit.

4. No proceeding to recover any penalty under this Ordinance shall be commenced except with the fiat of the Attorney General.

AN ORDINANCE for the licensing of Burial Grounds.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall not be lawful to bury the dead in any place not being a licensed burial ground: And any person who shall bury any body, or in anywise act or assist in the
