

for such sum or sums and to such person or persons as the Road Authority may think fit, and may out of the proceeds of such sale pay and reimburse themselves the amount of the costs and expenses certified as aforesaid and of the costs of sale, and the balance (if any) of the proceeds of the sale shall be paid over by the Road Authority to the said Joseph Brown Payne.

46. The powers and privileges given by this Ordinance are so given saving and reserving always the rights of Her Majesty, and of all bodies politic and corporate, and of all other persons, except such as are mentioned in this Ordinance, and those claiming by, from and under them.

AN ORDINANCE for regulating the Festivals of Immigrants.

(L.S.) J. SCOTT BUSHE, *Administrator.*

10th July, 1882.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Immigrants Festivals Ordinance, 1882." Short title.

2. The Governor is hereby authorized to make from time to time regulations for the government of the festivals of immigrants in this Colony, and of the Power to make regulations as to festivals.

processions held by them in connection therewith, and for defining the routes of such processions, and for preventing obstruction of the public highways by reason of such processions, and for securing the due maintenance of the public peace and tranquillity during such festivals and processions.

may be either
general or
special.

3. Such regulations may be either general and apply to every plantation or public highway, or special and apply only to particular plantations or highways; and the Governor may from time to time alter or vary such regulations or any of them, or make new regulations, as occasion requires.

4. Every such regulation shall be published in the *Royal Gazette*, and shall thereupon be binding upon the parties interested in the subject matter thereof in the same manner as if such regulation formed part of this Ordinance.

Penalty for
disregarding
any such

5. Every immigrant or other person who wilfully disregards any such regulation or wilfully disobeys the same or fails to conform himself thereunto, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction before a Stipendiary Justice of the Peace and shall be liable on conviction to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding six months, or to pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

Any one offending against this section may be arrested without warrant by any Constable within whose view the offence is committed and by him detained until he can be brought before a Justice of the Peace.
