AN ORDINANCE for the more frequent and regular
Inspection of indentured Immigrants.

May 22, 1865.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make provision for
the more frequent and regular Inspection of
Indentured Immigrants: Be it enacted by His Excel-
lency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the
Legislative Council, as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor from time to
time to appoint such fit and proper person or persons
as he may from time to time see fit to be inspector or
inspectors of Indentured Immigrants, and every person
so appointed may be removed from office by the
Governor at his pleasure.

2. Every Inspector of indentured Immigrants shall
have the same powers and authority as are given to the
Agent General of Immigrants by the Clauses marked
respectively 26 and 60 of the Ordinance passed in
council on the first day of March, one thousand eight
hundred and sixty-five, and entitled "An Ordinance with
regard to Immigration;" and every person who shall
obstruct any Inspector of indentured Immigrants in
entering upon any plantation where he may reasonably
suppose any indentured Immigrant to be employed, or
in enquiring into the state and condition of such
indentured Immigrant, shall on conviction thereof be
subject to the penalties imposed by the Clause marked
51 of the said Ordinance.
