AN ORDINANCE to regulate the use of Weighing Machines known as "Fairbank's Patent" Weighing Machines.

WHEREAS certain Weighing Machines, known as "Fairbank's Patent" Weighing Machines, have been and now are in use in the Colony, which Weighing

Machines are unjust, inasmuch as the Balance Ball thereof is moveable, and by the moving of such Balance Ball great frauds may be effected: And whereas such Weighing Machines may be rendered just and frauds may be prevented by rendering the Balance Balls of such Weighing Machines immoveable, and by stamping and ascertaining the Weights to be used with each such Machine: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for any Inspector of Weights and Measures, and he is hereby required on the request in writing of the owner or other person in possession of any Weighing Machine known as "Fairbank's Patent" Weighing Machines to visit and inspect such Weighing Machine; and such Inspector shall regulate and adjust the beam of such Machine, so that such beam may be truly balanced, and shall with a metal or other plate cover and seal up the opening in the frame of such Machine whereby access may be had to the Balance Ball of such Machine, and also fill and plug up with lead or other metal the hollow iron plate at the end of such beam, and shall stamp the same, and shall stamp or mark every such Weighing Machine so regulated and adjusted by him with a distinguishing number, and shall also compare, adjust and stamp or mark with the same number every Weight to be used with such Machine.

2. The Inspector shall deliver to the owner of any such Machine so regulated and adjusted by him a certificate of his having allowed the use thereof, which certificate shall be in the form to this Ordinance annexed, or to the like effect, and shall enter in a book, to be kept by him for that purpose, the distinguishing number of every such Machine which shall have been so adjusted and allowed by him, together with the name of the owner and the day on which such certificate shall have been granted by him, and the number of weights and the amount of each weight to be used with such Machine which shall have been so stamped and numbered by him.

3. Any person who at any time after the first day of May next shall use or have in his possession in any store or shop occupied by him, or any yard adjoining thereto, any Weighing Machine commonly known as "Fairbank's Patent" Weighing Machine, in respect of which a certificate shall not have been granted under this Ordinance, or shall use in the weighing of goods by such Machine any weight not being a weight so stamped and numbered to be used with such Machine as hereinbefore mentioned, or shall remove or displace, or attempt to remove or displace, any plate or metal with which the opening in the frame of such Weighing Machine or the hollow iron plate thereof shall have been covered, sealed, filled or plugged up, or shall use such Machine after any such plate or metal shall have been removed or displaced, shall on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace forfeit such Machine and the Weights belonging to the same, together with such sum not exceeding twenty pounds nor less than forty shillings, as the convicting Justice shall see fit, and the Machine and Weights so forfeited shall be delivered to the Inspector of Weights and Measures for the District.

4. There shall be paid to every such Inspector by the owner or person in possession of any such Machine in respect of which a certificate shall be granted under this Ordinance, and at the time of his granting such certificate the several fees and sums of money mentioned in the second Schedule to this Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to empower the Mayor and Burgesses of the Borough of San Fernando to lay down a tramroad from the Cipero Tramroad to the San Fernando Wharf.

WHEREAS the Mayor and Burgesses of San Fernando have by their petition to the Governor and Legislative Council prayed that they may be empowered to take up by way of loan on debentures the sum of fifteen thousand pounds to be applied (after repaying a sum of one thousand and seven pounds three shillings and eleven pence now due to Her Majesty for the rebuilding of the San Fernando Wharf) to the formation of a tramroad from the Cipero Tramroad at the terminus thereof on the lands of the Plantation Les Efforts to the San Fernando Wharf: And whereas a map or diagram drawn by Sylvester Devenish, Esquire, a sworn surveyor, has been deposited with the Keeper of
