AN ORDINANCE to amend the Judicature Ordinance.

[29th March, 1926.]

BE it enacted by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Judicature Short title.
(Amendment) Ordinance, 1926, and shall be read as one Construction.
with the Judicature Ordinance, hereinafter called the Cap. 85.

2. Section 10 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment
amended by the addition thereto of the following of s. 10 of
sub-section :— Cap. 35.

(3) The Registrar shall be a barrister-at-law or a solicitor, in either case of five years standing at least.

3. Sub-section (2) of section 33 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof shall be read the following:—

Cap. 24.

(2) Subject to the proviso hereinafter contained, appeals under the Summary Conviction Offences (Procedure) Ordinance arising in Tobago shall be heard and determined by a single Judge, who shall, for the purposes of such appeals, have and exercise all the powers and authorities of the Full Court, and his decision shall be final and without appeal:

Provided that such appeals shall be heard and determined in Trinidad in the same manner as the like appeals arising in Trinidad if the appellant, either at the time of giving notice of appeal, or within three days thereafter, gives notice in writing to the Clerk, as defined by the Summary Conviction Offences (Procedure) Ordinance, that he desires the appeal to be heard and determined by a Full Court.
