THE MOTOR VEHICLES AND ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, CHAP. 48:50

ORDER

MADE BY THE COMMISSIONER OF POLICE UNDER SECTION 68(1) OF THE
MOTOR VEHICLES AND ROAD TRAFFIC ACT

THE CEREMONIAL OPENING OF PARLIAMENT (TEMPORARY
PROVISIONS) ORDER, 1994

1. This Order may be cited as the Ceremonial Opening of Citation Parliament (Temporary Provisions) Order, 1994.
2. This Order has effect between the hours of 7.00 a.m. and 12.30 p.m. Duration on Monday, 17th October, 1994.
3. Drivers of vehicles approaching the Red House shall do so by Vehicular way of St. Vincent Street, Knox Street, Frederick Street, Hart Street or routes Abercromby Street.
4. Subject to paragraph 5, the following roads are closed to Roads closed vehicular traffic:
 - (a) Abercromby Street, between Queen Street and Duke Street;
 - (b) Knox Street;
 - (c) Hart Street;
 - (d) St. Vincent Street, between Duke Street and Queen Street; and
 - (e) Pembroke Street, between Duke Street and Knox Street.
5. Vehicular traffic along the roads referred to in paragraph 4 is Vehicular permitted for— traffic permitted
 - (a) the vehicles of—
 - (i) the President of the Senate;
 - (ii) the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
 - (iii) Ministers of Government; and
 - (b) vehicles bearing green, yellow, brown and red windscreen labels.

Parking
prohibited

6. Subject to paragraph 7, no person shall park a vehicle on—
- (a) Chancery lane;
 - (b) Sackville Street, between Richmond Street and St. Vincent Street;
 - (c) Hart Street;
 - (d) Abercromby Street, between Queen Street and Keate Street;
 - (e) Keate Street, between Charlotte Street and Frederick Street;
 - (f) Frederick Street, between Keate Street and Hart Street;
 - (g) Gordon Street, between Chancery Lane and Abercromby Street;
 - (h) Knox Street, between St. Vincent Street and Frederick Street;
 - (i) St. Vincent Street, between Duke Street and Queen Street;
 - (j) Pembroke Street, between Knox Street and Duke Street; and
 - (k) Edward Street, between Queen Street and Duke Street.

Parking
reserved

7. (1) The following persons may park their vehicles on Knox Street, between St. Vincent Street and Abercromby Street:

- (a) the President of the Senate;
- (b) the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
- (c) Ministers of Government whose cars bear red windscreen labels.

(2) A member of Parliament, other than those referred to in subparagraph (1), may park a vehicle bearing a yellow windscreen label on St. Vincent Street, between Duke Street and Queen Street.

(3) The following persons may park their vehicles on Knox Street, between Frederick Street and Abercromby Street:

- (a) members of the Diplomatic Corps;
- (b) heads of religious denominations;
- (c) Judges of the Supreme Court; and
- (d) drivers of vehicles bearing brown windscreen labels.

(4) A driver of a vehicle bearing a green windscreen label may park that vehicle on—

- (a) Abercromby Street, between Queen Street and Hart Street;
- (b) Pembroke Street, between Knox Street and Duke Street; and
- (c) Hart Street.

(5) A driver of a vehicle of the Trinidad and Tobago Regiment, may park that vehicle on Edward Street, between Queen Street and Sackville Street.

(6) A driver of a vehicle of the Trinidad and Tobago Police Service may park that vehicle on Edward Street, between Sackville Street and Duke Street.

8. Taxi drivers who normally ply—

Taxi stands

(a) the St. Ann's route from Hart Street, shall operate from the southern side of Queen Street, between Frederick Street and Abercromby Street; and

(b) the St. James route from Hart Street, shall operate from the southern side of Duke Street, between Frederick Street and Pembroke Street.

9. Without prejudice to any other liability incurred by the commission of a summary offence, vehicles found parked in contravention of this Order may be removed by the Police and impounded and dealt with in accordance with section 108(1)(b) of the Motor Vehicles and Road Traffic Act.
